GIS held practical exams of IGCSE and AS Level examinations for our students who wished to sit for the tests. The exams included IGCSE ICT Practical, AS Physics, Biology and Chemistry Practical's.

 All IGCSE students had to appear for a minimum of five subjects. IGCSE
can also be referred to as the O-Levels. These are normally taken in Grade 10.



AS Level students must appear for a minimum of three subjects for Grade 11 students and are followed by A2 levels at Grade 12.



Results for the May/June session usually appear in the first week of August. Results for the October/November session usually appear by the first week

of January.

International Recognition

Gulf International School has participated in a nation-wide research study on high-stakes testing. This study included

participants from GIS. The results of the study are to be published in the International Journal of Assessment and Evaluation. GIS School Director, Dr. Mathis, was part of a research team with professors and instructors from 3 prestigious universities: Imam Abdulrahman Bin Faisal University, Prince Mohammed University, and Purdue University in Indiana, USA. The research study investigated the effects of high-stakes testing on the stress and anxiety levels of students in middle schools across the Kingdom.

The results were alarming. Parents, educators and students must be led to understand that the effects of comprehensive, high-stakes testing have more negative rather than positive effects on students. Shorter, less-stressful, formative testing given more often over less amounts of materials has been found to cause less stress and anxiety to students. Equally important, parents, students and educators need to know that the outcomes of formative testing have been proven more effective in retention of knowledge than high-stakes summative testing.





Life Skills

Covid-19 and its devastating effects have touched many lives and the way of life for us all.

Social distancing, covering our faces when in public, additional attention to hand washing and many other health-conscious habits have changed the way we live, socialize and learn.

The many repercussions of this disease have led to learning from home and prevented social interaction for our children. One of our greatest concerns as educators has been the effect of these changes on the health and well-being of our students.

With this in mind, GIS has added a new program to our school's academic curriculum, Life Skills. Life Skills are character-building life lessons intended to give students guidance on how to respond to different social situations, how to cope during times of change and tips and advice on how to contemplate and respond to our feelings.

Our school counselor, Mrs. Rasha, writes, prepares and presents the delivery of these lessons. We have begun Life Skills classes with grades 4 and 5 once per week. GIS has plans to expand our program in the future, in sha Allah.

Parents' Days

GIS held it's first Parents Day for this academic year. Parents were invited to attend the school to meet their child's teachers and to receive their first quarter report cards.

In order to follow sensible precautions, GIS followed strict protocols for safety. First and foremost, we held three separate events; one for grades K-3, a second event for grades 4-7 and our final event for grades 8-12.

Only two members from each family were invited to attend. We asked that one parent only accompany the student. Secondly, no one was allowed to enter without an invitation and everyone had to wear a mask at all times and stay in assigned areas to promote social distancing.

GIS spent several weeks preparing for this event. We wanted to protect our students and parents as well as our faculty. We thank our parents for their support in making this event safe as well as informative.

To Test or Not to Test

Looking on how to asses student learning for the first quarter, our administration had many objectives to consider:

- 1. How would we administer the tests
- 2. How to consider the online situation
- 3. How to ensure reliable results to promote learning
- 4. How to ensure academic integrity

Looking at our options and searching best practice; we found that short unannounced quizzes offered the best method for all of our objectives. As an administration, our decision received a negative response from a small percentage of our parents who were concerned that students would receive low marks. The results of these unannounced quizzes speak for themselves.

Our first quarter marks were comparable if not slightly better in some cases, than our former high-stakes summative tests.
